12. Workshop on Central European States and their Relationships to Security and NATO

Workshop: To a big degree, all Central European countries permanently strived to become members of originally West European structures, notably EU and NATO. However, individual journeys to these aims differed, as the case of Slovakia and NATO makes it clear. In this session, journeys and strategies of Central European countries, while going through the process of accession to NATO, are to be followed, while attention shall also be paid to general security concerns.
