EMPHASIS

There are many ways of emphasizing a part of a sentence. Basic patterns are the following:

1. What is/was (that / the way, the fact) ...

What research has shown **is that** long-term investment produces positive results.

What made it an army was the way it was organized.

What I like about John is the fact he is so honest.

2. It is / was ... that / who ...

It is the art market that interests us now.

It was John who broke the vase.

3. Something ... is what / is who

<u>Drill</u> is what transformed these men into an army.

Money is what makes the world go round.

<u>John</u> is who you should talk to.

4. Inversion

- certain expressions with a negative or restrictive meaning can be put at the beginning of a sentence for EMPHASIS.
- > this happens mainly in written English or in a very formal style of speaking, such as a public speech.
- > the order of the subject and the verb is REVERSED.
- inversion can also take place with certain conditional sentences.

INVERSION typically takes place:

> after **negative** sentence openers

I have **never** seen such a horrible thing in all my life.

 \rightarrow

Never in all my life <u>have I</u> seen such a horrible thing.

No sooner <u>had I</u> walked into the door than the phone rang.

On no account should the house be left unlocked.

Under no circumstances should you lend Paul any money.

Not only <u>are there</u> problems with the students, **but also** with the teachers themselves.

> after only, rarely, little

I feel safe and secure only in this house.

 \rightarrow

Only in this house <u>do I</u> feel safe and secure.

Rarely has a debate attracted so much media attention.

Little <u>did</u> I know that this spelled the end of my career.

> with certain conditional sentences

If **you should** find cause for complaint, return the goods immediately.

 \rightarrow

Should you find cause for complaint, return the goods immediately.

If **Holmes hadn't** explained, Watson would never have understood the case.

 \rightarrow

Had Holmes not explained, Watson would never have understood the case.
