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- The change in the inter-institutional dimension of the E.U.
- 3 organisational and behavioural aspects of policy decision-making in the European Parliament:
 - a) committee work;
 - b) the division of labour within political party groups;
 - c) the building of majorities

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- a) Committee work in the European Parliament
- 1999 to 2004 European Parliament had 17 permanent committees
 - 1996 temporary committee of enquiry to examine the transit system
 - 1996 temporary committee of enquiry to deal with BSE crisis

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b) The division of labour within the political party groups

- political party groups control the agenda of European Parliament AND its internal organisation
- through Conference of Presidents (President of E. P. and chairmen/women of political party groups)

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c) The building of policy and policy decision-making majorities

- necessity to build majority support
between national Member state
MEP party groups

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- main political party groups in European Parliament:
 - social democrats
 - conservatives/Christian Democrats
 - liberals
 - greens

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- strong incentives for cohesive political party groups and for coalition policy decision-making formations
- growing inter-institutional ambitions and influence
- committee influence
- policy decision-making influence

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2. The relationship between the European Parliament and the national Member state parliaments

- Maastricht (1993) and Amsterdam (1997)

Treaties considerably increased status of European Parliament, especially as a policy decision-making body

- particularly in relation to national Member state parliaments

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CONTRADICTION:

- growth in legislative importance of E.U. (and European Parliament)

contradicts with

low public perception of importance of E.U. (and European Parliament)
