MODAL PERFECT

form: MODAL VERB + HAVE + PAST PARTICIPLE

Past modals are used

⇒ to express speculations or deductions about events in the past

What do you think has happened? Well, they may / might / could have missed the train.

⇒ to show a stronger degree of certainty

John **must have been fired** – his desk's gone. It **can't have been** Joe you saw – he's in Mongolia.

⇒ to express irritation

She **could / might have given** me the information but she didn't bother.

⇒ to express missed opportunities

She **could / might have had** a brilliant career but she gave it all up for love.

⇒ to express criticism or comments on past actions

The report should have been submitted a lot earlier. He shouldn't have resigned without having another job to go to. You ought to have made a reservation — there are no seats left now.

□ note the difference between NEEDN THAVE and DIDN TNEED
 TO

I **didn't need to come** into the office because there was no work for me to do, so I stayed at home. (=> So didn't go there.)

I **needn 't have gone** into the office because there was no work for me to do when I got there. (=> I went there, but it wasn 't necessary.)
