Why Logic?

Logics are formal languages to make statements about mathematical objects.

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Logics are formal languages to make statements about mathematical objects.

They are used everywhere in computer science:

- ▶ databases (SQL)
- ▶ regular expressions
- ▶ software verification, hardware verification
- ▶ controller synthesis
- ▶ type systems
- ▶ SAT-solvers (optimisation)
- ▶ theorem provers

Basic logic problems

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Model Checking

Given a model \mathfrak{M} and a formula φ , check whether $\mathfrak{M} \models \varphi$.

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Satisfiability

Given a formula φ , check whether there is some model \mathfrak{M} with $\mathfrak{M} \models \varphi$.
