





- ▶ 1789: 1st president George Washington
- ▶ 1800: Thomas Jefferson on his farm
- ▶ Republicans: posters, handbills etc.
- ▶ Republicans vs. Federalists
- ▶ Jefferson as a rapist?




Historical overview: The 1800 Elections

- ▶ Partisan attacks, but not national campaigns
- ▶ Only for white men owning property
- ▶ 1825



Historical overview: 1828 – 1852, Years of Change


- ▶ Jacksonian era
- ▶ many democratic changes
- ▶ Jackson elected by more popular votes
- ▶ Jackson to abolish Electoral College


Historical overview: The 1840 Elections

- ▶ the first truly popular presidential election campaign
- ▶ William H. Harrison (Whig) vs. Martin van Buren (Dem.)
- ▶ increase in right to vote
- ▶ “penny press”
 - ▶ 1830: 906 / 100
 - ▶ 1840: 1577 / 200
- ▶ campaign topics
- ▶ elections for the people




Historical overview: 2nd half of 19th Century

- ▶ 1861 – 1865: Abraham Lincoln
- ▶ Republican Party became a strong national organization
- ▶ behind the scene player
- ▶ unpopular at the beginning






Historical overview: 1st half of 20th Century

- ▶ Roosevelt, Theodore (1901 – 1909)
- ▶ Taft, William, H. (1909 – 1913)
- ▶ Wilson, Woodrow (1913 – 1921)
- ▶ Harding, Warren (1921 – 1923)
- ▶ Coolidge, Calvin (1923 – 1929)
- ▶ Hoover, Herbert (1929 – 1933)
- ▶ Roosevelt, Franklin D. (1933 – 1945)

- ▶ campaigns were traditional
- ▶ labour intensive
- ▶ partisan
- ▶ conventions, rallies, printed materials
- ▶ ads in cinema
- ▶ speeches




Historical overview: 1st half of 20th Century

“The only thing we have to fear is fear itself.”




Historical overview: 1st half of 20th Century


Historical overview: I Like Ike

- ▶ changes in campaigning style

- ▶ running mate: Richard Nixon
- ▶ end of Korean war
- ▶ conflicts in Hungary, Israel, France Suez Canal
- ▶ attacks on Nixon
- ▶ Footbal / Peace




Historical overview: JFK vs. Nixon

- ▶ the very first TV debate ever
- ▶ changing politics into the image fight
- ▶ viewer vs. listeners
- ▶ three debates all together
- ▶ Nixon underestimated the first debate
- ▶ Kennedy was facing the camera
- ▶ team of supporters for answering the questions

- ▶ Ford, Gerald (1974 – 1977)
- ▶ Carter, Jimmy (1977 – 1981)
- ▶ Reagan, Ronald (1981 – 1989)
- ▶ Bush, George H. W. (1989 – 1993)
- ▶ Clinton, Bill (1993 – 2001)
- ▶ Bush, George W. (2001 – 2009)
- ▶ Obama, Barack (2009 – now)



Historical overview: Let's Play Sax


- ▶ Bill Clinton / Al Gore



- ▶ 'Obama care'



Romney - \$1.238M






