## The German Speaking Countries





- Over 95 million people around the world speak German as their primary language
- 80 Million speak German as a second language
- 16% of the European Union's population speak German
- German is an official language in six
   European countries => Germany,
   Austria, Switzerland,
   Belgium, Luxembourg & Liechtenstein

#### The DACH Countries





- DACH countries
- More than 91% of the population in Germany speak German as their native language
  - >5 million people speak German as their second language
- Over 78% of the world's total
   German speakers live in Germany
  - 8% live in Austria
  - 7% live in other countries

Laws (EU regulation)	Laws (smoking)
EU membership	Switzerland's economic & trade relations with the EU are governed by bilateral agreements where Switzerland agreed to take over certain aspects of EU legislation in exchange for accessing part of the EU's single market


### Germany: Fun Facts
