

- Operationalization = movement from an abstract conceptual level to the "real" measurement level
 - Most concepts are impossible to observe empirically just like that
- Important properties of any measurement
 - Reliability
 - Validity

- Measurement reliability
 - = the extent to which it is repeatable and consistent
 - Example: coding of text documents, classifying countries as democratic/authoritarian, ...
 - Measurement bias
 - Not a big problem for theory testing
- Measurement validity
 - = the measure accurately represents the concept that it is supposed to measure
 - Example: measuring racism

Types of variables

- 1) Categorical (nominal)
 - Values cannot be ordered or ranked
 - Examples: country or residence, marital status, religious denomination
- 2) Ordinal
 - Can be ordered or ranked
 - Examples:

Is membership in the EU a good thing/neither good or bad/ bad thing?;

Strongly agree/agree/disagree/strongly disagree with a certain statement

Types of variables, continued.

- 3) Interval (continuous)
 - Can be ordered
 - Equal-unit differences
 - · One-unit increase will always mean the same thing
 - Examples: age in years, income in \$, percentage of votes gained in elections,...

How do I come up with my topic?

- What are you interested in?
- Check the IS for topics
- Read about it (academic literature)
 - look for gaps (things that haven't been done)
 - Review articles are a good place to start (e.g. Annual Reviews in Political Science)
- Browse through available data
 - · and consider own data collection
- Talk to people, brainstorm
 - colleagues, professors,
- Timeline:
 - Best begin thinking now, latest late summer after 4th semester.
