Legitimation

A (8)......born (1).....becomes legitimate if his parents subsequently (7) By the Legitimacy Act, 1926, an illegitimate person is legitimated by the (2) of his parents provided that at the date of the marriage (i) the illegitimate person is alive and (ii) the (9) is domiciled in England and Wales.

The (5) effect is that the (10) child is treated in nearly all respects as though he were legitimate or a lawful child. Should the parents die intestate, the legitimated child will succeed to their property. Moreover, he will have the same rights of (4) by parents as a lawful child.

Illegitimacy

A (8) born during wedlock is *prima facie* legitimate. Similarly a child born within the normal time after the termination of a (2) by the death of the husband or by divorce is presumed legitimate.

A child will only be (1) when the mother does not marry the father. If the mother does, however, (7) the father following the birth of the child, the child may be (10)
