WRITING AND LETTERS OF MOTIVATION

- \rightarrow Do you like writing? Do you prefer writing or typing? Are you a good writer?
- \rightarrow When you write in English, what sort of texts/documents do you write/type?
- \rightarrow What problems do you encounter when writing/typing in English?
- \rightarrow What is a motivation letter? Why would you write it? What should it contain?

A motivation letter, a motivational letter, a letter of motivation – usually attached to or accompanying another document such as a resume or CV=curriculum vitae. The main purpose of a motivational letter - also called cover letter - is demonstrate persuasively that you are the most suitable candidate for a specific position. It is used when applying for something such as acceptance to a university, a student programme, a non-profit organization, voluntary work, etc. It should contain: why you are interested in the specific activity/university/programme, your motives... etc (see below)

- 1) You should list all the schools you've attended, your grades and the jobs you've done in a motivation letter. **NO, ONLY RELEVANT ONES**
- 2) Assess the employer's needs and your skills. Then try to match them in the letter in a way that will appeal to the employer's interest. **YES**
- 3) You should be as specific as possible and use concrete examples. **YES**
- 4) It's recommendable to insert pictures and links in a motivation letter. **NO**
- 5) Copy-pasting is a good tip for preparing a motivation letter especially if you write more of them. NO, DEVELOP YOUR OWN VOICE, BORING
- 6) Arrange the points in a logical sequence; organize each paragraph around a main point. **YES**
- 7) A suitable length for a motivation letter is one and half to two pages. **EVEN SHORTER**
- 8) Demonstrate, if possible, some knowledge of the organization to which you are applying. **YES**
- 9) Most of the sentences should start with "I". NO, IT'S REPETITIVE

EXAMPLE OF TEST TASK:

You want to apply for an Erasmus exchange program to study one semester at the medical school of the prestigious University of Edinburgh. Along with your application, you will need to submit a motivation letter which should explain why you wish to study at the University of Edinburgh and provide any additional information that you feel may support your application. You text should be between <u>120 to 150 words (approximately 1 page)</u>.
