

General terms

Morbus, i, m. *e.g. morbus ischaemicus cordis* = Coronary artery disease (unspecified heart disease with decreased blood flow and oxygen to heart muscle)

Nos- (nósos = disease) *e.g. nosologia = study of classification of disease*

-pathia (unspecified pathology meaning suffering) *e.g.* aeropathia, neuropathia ethylica = decompression sickness, nerve damage



Suffixes denoting pathologies

Suffix	Meaning
-ia	Disease or abnormal condition
-ismus	Action or process
-iasis	Pathological morbid condition
-osis	refers to states especially abnormal processes and disorders

-ia

Alopecia, ae, f.

- condition that causes hair loss in small patches

-greek word "alopekia" meaning fox mange + ia

Bulimia, ae , f.

- eating disorder characterized by overeating followed by self-induced vomiting

Originates from greek word "boulimia" meaning ravenous (starving) hunger





-ismus

Autismus, i, n.

- development disorder characterized by difficulties with social interactions and communication

- greek word originates from "autos" meaning self +ismus

Nicotinismus, i, n.

- excessive use of tobacco associated with nicotine poison and depression

- originates from the latin word "Nicotania" meaning tobacco +ismus



-iasis

Psoriasis, is, f. (dosis)

- skin disorder resulting in skin to multipy at 10 times then normal rate
- originates from greek word "psora" meaning to itch + iasis

Lithiasis, is , f.

- formation of congregations in body (urinary tract)
- originates from greek work "lithos" meaning stone + iasis



-osis



Steatosis, is ,f.

- abnormal retention of fat within cells and organs
- originates from greek word "stear" meaning fat + osis

Tuberculosis, is ,f.

- -mycobacterium attacking lungs and other organs
- Tuberculum + osis combined

Eponyms & Toponyms


Morbus Crohn: discovered Dr. Burrill Bernard Crohn (1932) who detected the same type of ileum inflammation in multiple patients

Symptoms:

- Abdominal pain, diarrhea, fever, weight loss
- Can cause anemia or bowel cancer

Morbus Meniere: by Prosper Méniére (early 1800s) Symptoms:

• Inner ear disorder can be vertigo, hearing loss, tinnitus



Eponyms & Toponyms

Borelliosis, is, f. : Willy Burgdorfer (1982) discovered the bacteria that results a disease carried by ticks (Borrelia Burgdorferi)

Symptoms:

 Fever, chills, headache, fatigue, muscle and joint aches, swollen lymph nodes

Tularaemia, ae , f.: plague like dieases first discovered among squirrels in Tulare, California

Symptoms:

• Irritation and inflammation of the eye and swelling of lymph nodes



Syndroma, matis, N.

Greek word meaning "place where several roads meet "

Resembles idea that certain types of symptoms will always appear with certain diseases

AIDS

- = acquired immunodeficiency syndrome
 - Infectious immunological disease which targets immune system

Risk factors:

- > Unprotected sex, needle sharing, unsterile medical procedures
- Early symptoms: flu
- Later symptoms: suffer from increased size of lymph nodes, fever and severe weight loss



Cushing Syndroma

= symptoms due to prolonged exposure to glucocorticoids (cortisol)

Symptoms:

- High blood pressure
- Abdominal obesity with thin extremities
- Red stretch marks
- Weak muscles
- Acne

Carpal Tunnel Syndrome

- n. medianus is compressed

Symptoms :

• Pain, numbness, poor grip and hand muscle control



Urticaria, ae, f.	Utrica, ae, f.	Urere
 Hives Red itchy skin reaction 	 Flowering plant Causes hives if eaten incorrectly 	- burning







Elephantiasis, is, f.	Elephas, antis, m.
 Enlarging/hardening of limbs due to swelling Caused by parasites Transmitted by mosquitoes 	 Elephant Swelling body of an infected person resembles the large body of an elephant





Lupus, i, m.	Lupus, i, m. Erythematosus, i, m.	Erúthema
 Directly translates to wolf Pattern of inflammation resembles the bite of a wolf 	 Autoimmune disease causes inflammation of tissue 	 Greek word: redness of skin Originates from greek word for red "eruthros"



Exanthema, atis, n.	Exanthein	Anthien
 Body wide rash Usually in children Caused by drugs, toxins or autoimmune disease 	 Greek verb Indicates an outwards breakout or spread 	 Greek verb "to blossom" Originates from anthos meaning flower





Nausea, ae, f.

- common symptoms
- Associated with abdominal pain and loss of appetite
- Occurs with food poisoning, infections and pregnancy
- Naus: greek word for ship
- Nausia: greek word for sea sickness

Example: Dolor intra graviditatem propter nauseam



Marasmus, i, m.


- Severe weight loss and dehydration
- Ribs clearly visible through skin and stomach shrinks
- Can be caused by malnutrition
- Marasmos: greek word for indicating withering and decay
- Example: patiens cum marasmo



Cachexia, ae, f.

- Condition where fat and muscle are wasted and they are not preserved
- $\,\circ\,$ Heavily associated with cancer or HIV
- > Kakhexia: greek word referring to be in a bad state


Example: Cachexia post graviditatem



Somnolentia, ae, f.

- $\,\circ\,$ To be tired and drowsy
- Conditions sich as sleeping disorders, stress and depression
- Somnus: latin verb for sleep

Example: Somnolentia propter depressionem



Vertigo, inis, f.

- Sensation of dizziness and misorientation
- Caused by random movements of cochlear fluid, ear infections and Meniere's disease
- Vertere: latin verb for turning

Example: Vertigo propter otitidem
