a wound /wʊnd/ / to wound- past: wounded /wʊndəd/- past participle: wounded /wʊndəd/

1 an injury to part of the body, especially one in which a hole is made in the skin using a weapon a **leg/head, etc.**

wound a **bullet/knife/gunshot/stab wound**

an old **war wound**

The nurse **cleaned the wound**.

The **wound healed** slowly.

He died from the wounds he had received to his chest.

to wind /waɪnd/ - past: wound /waʊnd/ - past participle: wound /waʊnd/

some meanings:

1. to make a clock or other piece of machinery work by turning a knob, handle, etc. several times; to be able to be made to work in this way

wind something (up):

He had forgotten to wind his watch.

It was one of those old-fashioned gramophones that winds up.

2. to operate a tape, film, etc. so that it moves nearer to its ending or starting position

wind something forward/back: He wound the tape back to the beginning.

wind forward/back: Wind forward to the bit where they discover the body.

PHRASAL VERB wind down /waɪnd daʊn/

(of a person) to rest or relax after a period of activity or excitement

Synonym to [unwind](#) /anwaɪnd/
