**4 - sb (for sth) (with sth)** to give medical care or attention to a person, an illness, an injury, etc.: She was treated for sunstroke. •The condition is usually treated with drugs and a strict diet. •The hospital treated forty cases of malaria last year.

# treat-ment noun

**1** [U, C] ~ **(for sth)** something that is done to cure an illness or injury, or to make sb look and feel good: He is receiving treatment for shock.  $\diamond$ She is responding well to treatment.  $\diamond$ to require hospital / medical treatment  $\diamond$ There are various treatments available for this condition. Guests at the health spa receive a range of beauty treatments.

cure yerh, nonn

 $\blacksquare$ verb

1 - sb (of sth) to make a person or an animal healthy again after an illness: Will you be able to cure him. Doctor?

2 to make an illness go away: TB is a serious illness, but it can be cured.

**■**noun

1 ~ (for sth) a medicine or medical treatment that cures an illness: the search for a cure for cancer ⊕There is no known cure but the illness can be treated. ⊕The only real cure is rest.

## heal verb

1 ~ (up) to become healthy again; to make sth healthy again: It took a long time for the wounds to heal. ♦The cut healed up without leaving a scar. This will help to heal your cuts and scratches. ♦(figurative)

# IN PLACE / POSITION

1 to move sth into a particular place or position: Put the cases down there, please. Did you put sugar in my coffee? Put your hand up if you need more paper.

# give yerb, noun. HAND / PROVIDE

1 ~ sth to sb| ~ sb sth to hand sth to sb so that they can look at it, use it or keep it for a time: Give the letter to your mother when you've read it. ⋄Give your mother the letter. ⋄ They were all given a box to carry. ⋄She gave her ticket to the woman at the check-in desk. 2 ~ sth to sb| ~ sb sth to hand sth to sb as a present; to allow sb to have sth as a present:
