

2. Word order

1. Adjectives follow nouns (exception: *dura mater, pia mater*).
2. Non-agreed attributes in genitive come after the word they describe.

Typical anatomy word order:

structure – type of structure – location (noun) – other descriptors (adjectives)

Examples:

- *Musculus extensor – carpi – radialis longus* (extensor = type of muscle)
- *Ligamenta – tarsi – interossea* (interossea = location descriptor)
- *Processus styloideus – ossis metacarpi tertii* (styloideus = type of process)

Typical medical report word order:

problem – localization – additional details

Examples:

- *Congelationes – digitii tertii et quarti pedis lateris dextri – gradus tertii*
- *Vulnus lacerum* – superciliis lateris sinistri et labii inferioris lateris dextri – ad suturam*
- *Tumor – pulmonis lateris sinistri – ad diaphragma – increscens***

* when describing types of wounds (*vulnus + ...*), noun and adjective always stand directly next to each other

** tumor growing into the diaphragm = *ad diaphragma* precedes *increscens* because it is a localization of the tumor

While this word order is the most common, deviations from these rules (especially in anatomy) exist: *venae dorsales linguae*. The word order can be called incorrect only if it violates rules 1 and 2 (see above).
