| <u>Question</u> : Do I/you/we/they start at 8:00? Does she/he/it start at 8:00? | Yes, I do. No, I don't. Yes, she does. No, she doesn't. |
| Use : 1 Facts which are always true | Water boils at 100 degrees Celsius. |

Facts which are always true
Water boils at 100 degrees Celsius.
Habitual actions (routines, habits)
I usually go to work by car.
Permanent situations and states
Future facts
Water boils at 100 degrees Celsius.
I usually go to work by car.
My parents live in London. They have been there for 20 years.
My train leaves at 7:00.

Negative:

Common time adverbials with the Present Simple: always, usually, regularly, every morning, often, sometimes, twice a week, from time to time, occasionally, rarely, seldom, once a month, hardly ever, never.

Present continuous

Form: <u>Positive:</u> Subject + to be + verb-ing I **am going** outside. You **are going** outside....

Question: to be + subject + verb-ing Are you going outside? Is he going outside?

Use:

An activity happening now
Temporary situations and habits
An annoying habit
Personal arrangements for the future

I **am not going** outside. You **are not going** outside. ...

Subject + not to be + verb-ing

Yes, I am. No, I am not. Yes, he is. No, he isn't.

I'm doing the washing-up just now. *I'm living* with some friends until I can find a flat. You'**re always borrowing** money from me! We **are going** to Prague on Saturday.

Common time adverbials: just, now, at the moment, at the present.
