After many adjectives we use particular prepositions, for example **afraid of**, **interested in** and **bored with**.

Here are some common examples of these adjective + preposition combinations:

ABOUT

excited about, worried about, nervous about, angry about sth., annoyed about sth., furious about

ΑT

good at, bad at, clever at, hopeless at

FOR

famous for, well known for, responsible for

OF

afraid of, frightened of, scared of, proud of, full of, aware of, tired of

nice / kind / good / friendly / polite / rude / stupid of someone to do something

TO

engaged to, married to, similar to be nice/ kind/ good/ friendly/ polite/ rude to someone

WITH

pleased with, disappointed with, happy with, satisfied with, angry/ annoyed with sb.
