VERBS	MODEL SENTENCES showing the correct word order.
care for sth.	He didn't care for her friends.
carry on (with sth./doing st.)	Carry on with your work while I'm away. He carried on reading the newspaper.
cut sth. down; cut down (on) sth.	We need to cut the article down to 1 000 words. The doctor told him to cut down on <u>his drinking.</u>
■ fill sth. in	To order, fill in the coupon on page 54.
■ put sth. off	Let's put the meeting off until next Friday.
