

# WORD ORDER

# Typical word order in declarative sentences :

**<u>SVOMPT</u>**: Subject  $\rightarrow$  Verb $\rightarrow$ Object  $\rightarrow$  Manner  $\rightarrow$  Place  $\rightarrow$  Time

e.g. I (S) met (V) her (O) in front of the cinema (P) at 8 o'clock (T).

My friends (S) like (V) my music (O) very much (M).

Celeste (S) would like to go (V) to Greece (P) next summer (T).

# Typical word order in questions :

# **QUASI / ASI:**

(Question word)  $\rightarrow$  Auxiliary verb  $\rightarrow$  Subject  $\rightarrow$  Infinitive of the main verb  $\rightarrow$  ...

e.g. Where (QU) did (A) you (S) go (I) last night?
Why (QU) does(A) she (S) do (I) it?
Can (A) you (S) repeat (I) it once again?
Will (A) Tom(S) be (I) here?

# The most common question words:

1) We use **WHAT** with a noun (e.g. what colour, what nationality) or without a noun to ask mostly about things.

e.g. What is Ken doing? What would you like to drink? What colour is your car?

2) We use WHO without a noun to ask about people.e.g. Who is your favourite singer?Who told you about it?

3) We use **WHICH (OF)** with or without a noun to ask about things or people when there is a restricted choice.

e.g. *Which* ice cream do you like most – vanilla, chocolate or pistachio? *Which* would you like – beer or wine? *Which of* these questions is the easiest? *Which one* do you prefer – Johnny Depp or Orlando Bloom?

4) We use WHOSE with or without a noun to ask about possession.

e.g. Whose coat is this?

#### 5) WHERE, WHEN, WHY

We use WHERE to ask about place, WHEN to ask about time, WHY to ask about reason or purpose e.g. Where are you going on holiday? When was she born? Why are you late?

6) We use **HOW** to ask 'in what way?' OR in greetings, introductions and to ask about state of health OR with adjectives/ adverbs and with much/many

e.g. How did you get there?
How are you?
How is your mother now?
How much milk is there in the fridge?
How often do you go to the cinema?
How old is she?

Note the position of prepositions in questions beginning Who/What/Which/Where...?: Who do you want to speak to? Which job has Jane applied for? What was the weather like yesterday?

Where do you come from?

# **SUBJECT /OBJECT QUESTIONS**

Look at these two questions.

- Frank loves someone. Who does Frank love? (Object question)
- Someone loves Frank. Who loves Frank? (Subject question)

In subject questions - the question word is the subject of the sentence

- there is no auxiliary verb
- the word order is not inverted.

#### More examples:

Jack saw Carol in the evening.

(Somebody saw Carol)	(Jack saw somebody)
Who saw Carol in the evening?	Who did Jack see in the evening?
(Subject question)	(Object question)

Andrew likes pears.Who likes pears? – Andrew likes pears.(Subject question) $\rightarrow$  What does Andrew like? – Andrew likes pears.(Object question)

Jane has already met my brother.  $\rightarrow$  Who has met my brother? - Jane has met my brother.  $\rightarrow$  Who has Jane met? – Jane has met my brother.
