## Adjectives

There are two types of adjectives in Japanese. One type is called "v-adjectives," and the other type "\$\frac{1}{2}\tag{2}

## v-adjectives:

おもしろい映画 an interesting movie

きのう、おもしろい映画を見ました。 I saw an interesting movie yesterday.

こわい先生 a scary teacher

山下先生はこわい先生です。 Professor Yamashita is a scary teacher.

## な-adjectives:

きれいな写真 a beautiful picture

京都できれいな写真を撮りました。 I took a beautiful picture in Kyoto.

元気な先生 an energetic teacher

山下先生は元気な先生です。 Professor Yamashita is an energetic teacher.

Japanese adjectives conjugate for tense (present and past), polarity (affirmative and negative), and so forth, just as verbs do. The two types of adjectives follow different conjugation patterns.

**L'adjectives** 'vadjectives change shape as follows. You will want to be very careful here, because the pattern is rather complicated.

おもしろい	10.124	affirmátive	negative
	present	おもしろいです	おもしろくありません
		It is interesting.	It is not interesting.
	past	おもしろかったです	おもしろくありませんでした
		It was interesting.	It was not interesting.

L1L1 (irregular)	affirmative	negative

past	よかったです	よくありませんでした

な-adjectives The conjugation pattern of  $\mathfrak{T}$ -adjectives is much more straightforward. It actually is exactly the same as the conjugation table of です which follows a noun, as discussed in Lesson 4.

元気(な)		affirmative	negative
	present	元気です	元気じゃありません
		She is healthy.	She is not healthy.
	past	元気でした	元気じゃありませんでした
		She was healthy.	She was not healthy.

The final syllable & is dropped in these long forms of &-adjectives.
