Translate the following into Cantonese using the adverbs of time.

1. I go to school 4 times per week
2. I originally wanted to study English but now I study Chinese
3. I just had dinner
4. I go to work immediately after school
5. I go to school every day

Adverbs of time

Given that verbs do not indicate tense in Cantonese, adverbs are especially important in specifying when events take place:

keoi5 ji4 gaa1 zung6 hai2 ji1 jyun2 佢而家仲喺醫院
She's still in hospital (now).

keoi5 go2 zan6 si4 zung6 hai2 ji1 jyun2 佢嗰陣時仲喺醫院
She was still in hospital (then).

ngo5 zik1 hak1 heoi3 jing1 gwok3 taam3 nei5 我即刻去英國探你
I'm going to visit you in England (right away).

ngo5 dai6 ji6 si4 heoi3 jing1 gwok3 taam3 nei5 我第二時去英國探你
I'll visit you in England (in the future).

In English, the tense of the verb indicates when things take place, and the adverb can easily be omitted, while in Cantonese only the adverb indicates the time. Common adverbs include:

UNIT 12

Comparison

Gwo3 過 and dī 嘅

In this unit, we look at ways of making simple comparisons. In colloquial Cantonese, there are two basic kinds of comparison:

- (a) Where two things are explicitly being compared, **gwo** 過 is used to mean ‘more (adjective) than (noun)’. The word order is similar to the English (and quite unlike that in Mandarin):

Jenny sai3 gwo3 ngo5	Jenny is younger than me.
Jenny 細過我	
baat3 lau2 hou2 gwo3 ji6 lau2 八樓好過二樓	The eighth floor is better than the second floor.
ni1 deoi3 gwai3 gwo3 go2 deoi3 呢對貴過嗰對	This pair is more expensive than that one.

Note that **gwo** 過 is also a verb meaning ‘cross’ or ‘pass’, so it is natural that it comes to mean ‘surpass’ in comparisons.

- (b) If the object of comparison is not expressed (i.e. there is no ‘than ...’), **dī** 嘅 is used instead:

Jenny sai3 di1 Jenny細啲	Jenny is younger.
baat3 lau2 hou2 di1 八樓好啲	The eighth floor is better.
go2 deoi3 gwai3 di1 呢對貴啲	That pair is more expensive.

dī 啟 literally means ‘a little’ but here serves largely to indicate a difference between the two items with respect to some property.

Modifying comparisons

Both kinds of comparison can be modified by adverbs of degree such as **hóu dō** 好多 ‘much’ and **síu-síu** 少少 ‘a little’, as follows:

- (a) In comparisons with **gwo** 過, the adverb of degree is simply added at the end of the construction:

nei5 lek1 gwo3 keoi5 hou2 do1
你叻過佢好多

You're much smarter than him.

keoi5 gou1 gwo3 nei5 siu2 siu2
佢高過你少少

She's a little taller than you.

ngo5 daai6 gwo3 keoi5 jat1 nin4
我大過佢一十

I'm a year older than her.

- (b) In comparisons where **dī 啟** would normally be used, a degree word such as **hóu dō** 好多 ‘a lot’ replaces **dī 啟**:

Lī go leng dī

呢個靚啓

Lī go gwai dī

呢個貴啓

ni1 go3 cung5 di1

呢個重啓

→ **Lī go leng hóu dō**

呢個靚好多

→ **Lī go gwai síu-síu**

呢個貴少少

→ ni1 go3 cung5 gei2 pui5

呢個重幾倍

This one is much nicer.

This one is a little more expensive.

This one is several times heavier.

The reason for this is that **dī 啓** literally means ‘a bit’, so that combining it with an adverb like **hóu dō** 好多 ‘a lot’ would be a contradiction in terms. This shows that **dī 啓** as in **leng dī** 靚啓 is not really equivalent to the suffix **-er** in English ‘prettier’.

zung6 仲 ‘even’ can be applied to both the **gwo** 過 and **di** 哟 constructions but comes *before* the adjective:

gam1 ci3 zung6 hou2 gwo3 soeng6 ci3 i

今次仲好過上次

gam2 joeng2 zung6 hou2 di1 i

咁樣仲好(喟)

This time is even better than
last time.

This way is even better.

(**di** 哟 can be omitted here since the presence of **juhng** 仲 implies that a comparison is being made.)

Make the following comparisons more explicit using the adverb given in brackets:

1. This year is (much) colder [dung3凍] than last year
2. It's (much) warmer [nyun5 暖] today
3. Your hair is (a little) shorter [dyun2短] now
4. Hong Kong is (several times) more expensive than here

7. She is (5cm lei4 mai5厘米) taller than me
8. My elder brother is (20 pounds bong6磅) heavier than me

UNIT 16

Verbs of giving

bei2 罢

給

bei 罢 is an important verb used both on its own as a verb meaning 'give' and together with other verbs of giving. The verb **bei** 罢 takes two objects, the direct object (representing what is given) followed by the indirect object (representing the person to whom something is given):

keoi5 bei2 zo2 jat1 baak3 man1 ngo5 佢畀咗一百蚊我

(lit. she gave one hundred dollars me)

She gave me a hundred dollars.

ngo5 bei2 zo2 tiu4 so2 si4 ngo5 taai3 taai2 我畀咗條鎖匙我太太

I gave my wife the key.

bei2 gan1 coi3 ngo5 aa1 罷斤菜我吖

Give me a catty of vegetables, please.

nei5 bei2 di1 min2 keoi5 laa1 你畀啲面佢啦!

Show her some respect!

Note that the order of the two objects here is the reverse of that in English as well as that in Mandarin.

gei3

bei2

With other verbs of giving such as **gei** 寄 ‘send’ and **waan** 邊 ‘return’, **bei** 罢 ‘to’ is used to introduce the indirect object:

I ngo5 pang4 jau5 **gei3** zo2 zoeng1 kaat1 **bei2** ngo5 我朋友寄咗張卡畀我

My friend sent me a card.

I ngo5 ji5 ging1 **waan4** zo2 cin2 **bei2** nei5 我已經還咗錢畀你

I've already returned the money to you.

keoi5 lou5 gung1 **lau4** zo2 gaan1 uk1 **bei2** keoi5 佢老公留咗間屋畀佢

Her husband left her the house.

Note here the verb **sung3** 送 which is used in this pattern to mean ‘give’ in the sense of giving presents:

di1 tung4 si6 **sung3** zo2 di1 faa1 **bei2** keoi5 哟同事送咗啲花畀佢

Her colleagues gave her some flowers.

keoi5 nin4 nin4 **sung3** saang1 jat6 lai5 mat6 **bei2** ngo5 go3 zai2

佢年年送生日禮物畀我個仔

She gives my son a birthday present every year.

ni1 zek3 gaai3 zi2 **sung3 bei2** nei5 ge3 ! 呢隻戒子送畀你嘅!

This ring is (a present) for you!

A third verb may be added to the construction to indicate the purpose for which the object will be used:

keoi5 wui5 **gei3** di1 man4 gin2 **bei2** nei5 **cim1 meng2**

佢會寄啲文件畀你簽名

She will send the documents for you to sign.

go3 hok6 saang1 **lo2** zo2 pin1 man4 zoeng1 **bei2** ngo5 **tai2**

個學生擺咗篇文章畀我睇

The student brought an article for me to read.

keoi5 jiu3 **zyu2** faan6 **bei2** uk1 kei5 jan4 **sik6**

佢要煮飯畀屋企人食

She has to cook for her family (to eat).

Béi 界 and permission

béi 界 can also indicate permission (allowing, letting someone do something):

lou5 si1 **bei2** ngo5 dei6 zou2 di1 zau2
老師界我哋早啲走

The teacher let us leave early.

ngo5 **bei2** nei5 jung6 ngo5 bou6 din6 nou5 **óuh**
我界你用我個電腦

I'll let you use my computer.

m4 hou2 **bei2** jan4 zi1 aa3 唔好界人知呀

Don't let anyone know.

Translate the following into Cantonese

1. I have to pay (money)
2. You need to return some books.

Experiential gwo 過

The ‘experiential’ meaning of **gwo** 過 corresponds to one of the meanings of the present perfect in English – that something has happened at least once. Given a human subject, this is essentially the concept of experience, hence the grammatical term ‘experiential’ to describe this function. Typical cases are:

nei5 jau5 mou4 **sik6 gwo3** gong2 sik1 sai1 caan1 aa3? 你冇食過港式西餐呀?
Have you eaten Hong Kong-style western food?

nei5 **heoi3 gwo3** taai3 hung1 gun2 mei6 aa3? 你去過太空館未呀?
Have you been to the Space Museum?

Adverbs which call for **gwo** 過 include **cang4 ging1** 曾經 ‘once’ and **mei6** 未 ‘not yet’:

keoi5 **cang4 ging1** oi3 **gwo3** ngo5
佢曾經愛過我 She once loved me.

ngo5 **mei6** jam2 **gwo3** ni1 zek3 zau2
我未飲過呢隻酒 I've not drunk this wine before.

zo2 呃 **versus** gwo3 過

jó 呃 and gwo 過 may appear similar in meaning, both corresponding to the present perfect forms of the verb in English. Indeed there will be cases when either makes sense:

ngo5 tai2 zo2 saam1 go3 ji1 sang1

我睇咗三個醫生

ngo5 tai2 gwo3 saam1 go3 ji1 sang1

我睇過三個醫生

I've (just) seen three doctors.

I've seen three doctors
(before).

keoi5 se2 zo2 jat1 pin1 man4

佢寫咗一篇文

keoi5 se2 gwo3 jat1 pin1 man4

佢寫過一篇文

ngo5 wan2 zo2 nei5 gei2 ci3

我搵咗你幾次

ngo5 wan2 gwo3 nei5 gei2 ci3

我搵過你幾次

He's (just) written an article.

He's written an article
(before).

I've looked for you several
times (recently).

I've looked for you several
times (before).

In such cases, **jó 咁** puts a focus on the result or current relevance of the action, while **gwo 過** makes it of less immediate relevance:

ngo5 maai5 zo2 ni1 zek3 paai4 zi2 我買咗呢隻牌子

I've bought this brand (and still have it).

ngo5 maai5 gwo3 ni1 zek3 paai4 zi2 我買過呢隻牌子

I've bought this brand (before, in the past).

keoi5 heoi3 zo2 gei1 coeng4 佢去咗機場

He's gone to the airport (and is still there or on his way).

keoi5 heoi3 gwo3 gei1 coeng4 佢去過機場

He's been to the airport (but is no longer there).

Questions with meih 未

Statements with either **jó** 咉 or **gwo** 過 can be turned into yes/no questions by adding **meih** 未 (see also Unit 23).

nei5 sik1 zo2 dang1 mei6 aa3

Have you turned the light(s) off?

你熄咗燈未呀?

nei5 si3 gwo3 ni1 zung2 hoeng1 seo12 mei6 aa3

Have you tried this perfume before?

你試過呢種香水未呀?

Such questions are answered by the verb + **jó** 咉 or **gwo** 過 (for a positive answer) or by **meih** 未 alone (for a negative answer):

A: nei5 cung1 zo2 loeng4 mei6 aa3

Have you taken a bath yet?

你沖咗涼未呀?

B: cung1 zo2 laa3/ mei6 aa3

Yes/no.

沖咗喇/未呀

A: nei5 si3 gwo3 ni1 di1 mei6 aa3

Have you ever tried these?

你試過呢啲未呀?

B: si3 gwo3 laa3/ mei6 aa3 a

Yes/no.

試過喇/未(試過)呀

Negating zo2 呃 and gwo 過

Because it suggests completion of an action, zo2 呃 is not compatible with negation. The negative counterpart of zo2 左 is mou4 冇 (have not) or meih 未 (not yet):

E keoi5 jing1 sing4 zo2 ngo5 佢應承咃我	He (has) promised me.
E keoi5 mou4 jing1 sing4 ngo5 佢冇應承我	He didn't promise me.
N ngo5 dei6 sik6 zo2 faan6 我嚟食咃飯	We've had our dinner.
N ngo5 dei6 mei6 sik6 faan6 我嚟未食飯	We haven't had dinner yet.

Unlike jó 呃, gwo 過 can be negated either with móuh冇 or meih 未:

ngo5 mou4 sau1 gwo3 nei5 gei3 cin2 我冇收過你嘅錢	I have not received your money.
keoi5 mei6 zou6 gwo3 sau2 seot6 佢未做過手術	She has not yet had an operation.
