## Verbs of giving

bei2 罢

給

**bei** 罢 is an important verb used both on its own as a verb meaning 'give' and together with other verbs of giving. The verb **bei** 罢 takes two objects, the direct object (representing what is given) followed by the indirect object (representing the person to whom something is given):

keoi5 bei2 zo2 jat1 baak3 man1 ngo5 佢畀咗一百蚊我

(lit. she gave one hundred dollars me)

She gave me a hundred dollars.

ngo5 bei2 zo2 tiu4 so2 si4 ngo5 taai3 taai2 我畀咗條鎖匙我太太

I gave my wife the key.

bei2 gan1 coi3 ngo5 aa1 罷斤菜我吖

Give me a catty of vegetables, please.

nei5 bei2 di1 min2 keoi5 laa1 你畀啲面佢啦!

Show her some respect!

Note that the order of the two objects here is the reverse of that in English as well as that in Mandarin.

gei3

bei2

With other verbs of giving such as **gei** 寄 ‘send’ and **waan** 邊 ‘return’, **bei** 罢 ‘to’ is used to introduce the indirect object:

I ngo5 pang4 jau5 **gei3** zo2 zoeng1 kaat1 **bei2** ngo5 我朋友寄咗張卡畀我

My friend sent me a card.

I ngo5 ji5 ging1 **waan4** zo2 cin2 **bei2** nei5 我已經還咗錢畀你

I've already returned the money to you.

keoi5 lou5 gung1 **lau4** zo2 gaan1 uk1 **bei2** keoi5 佢老公留咗間屋畀佢

Her husband left her the house.

Note here the verb **sung3** 送 which is used in this pattern to mean ‘give’ in the sense of giving presents:

di1 tung4 si6 **sung3** zo2 di1 faa1 **bei2** keoi5 哟同事送咗啲花畀佢

Her colleagues gave her some flowers.

keoi5 nin4 nin4 **sung3** saang1 jat6 lai5 mat6 **bei2** ngo5 go3 zai2

佢年年送生日禮物畀我個仔

She gives my son a birthday present every year.

ni1 zek3 gaai3 zi2 **sung3 bei2** nei5 ge3 ! 呢隻戒子送畀你嘅!

This ring is (a present) for you!

A third verb may be added to the construction to indicate the purpose for which the object will be used:

keoi5 wui5 **gei3** di1 man4 gin2 **bei2** nei5 **cim1 meng2**

佢會寄啲文件畀你簽名

She will send the documents for you to sign.

go3 hok6 saang1 **lo2** zo2 pin1 man4 zoeng1 **bei2** ngo5 **tai2**

個學生擺咗篇文章畀我睇

The student brought an article for me to read.

keoi5 jiu3 **zyu2** faan6 **bei2** uk1 kei5 jan4 **sik6**

佢要煮飯畀屋企人食

She has to cook for her family (to eat).

## Béi 界 and permission

béi 界 can also indicate permission (allowing, letting someone do something):

lou5 si1 **bei2** ngo5 dei6 zou2 di1 zau2  
老師界我哋早啲走

The teacher let us leave early.

ngo5 **bei2** nei5 jung6 ngo5 bou6 din6 nou5      **óuh**  
我界你用我個電腦

I'll let you use my computer.

m4 hou2 **bei2** jan4 zi1 aa3      唔好界人知呀

Don't let anyone know.

Translate the following into Cantonese

1. I haven't paid
2. I didn't pay
3. Talking on the phone (gong2 din6 waa2) is not allowed in cinemas (hei3 jyun2)
4. He returned money to me
5. I bought a gift (lai5 mat6 禮物) to her
6. Can you give me your phone number?

## Experiential gwo 過

The ‘experiential’ meaning of **gwo** 過 corresponds to one of the meanings of the present perfect in English – that something has happened at least once. Given a human subject, this is essentially the concept of experience, hence the grammatical term ‘experiential’ to describe this function. Typical cases are:

nei5 jau5 mou4 **sik6 gwo3** gong2 sik1 sai1 caan1 aa3? 你冇食過港式西餐呀?  
Have you eaten Hong Kong-style western food?

nei5 **heoi3 gwo3** taai3 hung1 gun2 mei6 aa3? 你去過太空館未呀?  
Have you been to the Space Museum?

Adverbs which call for **gwo** 過 include **cang4 ging1** 曾經 ‘once’ and **mei6** 未 ‘not yet’:

keoi5 **cang4 ging1** oi3 **gwo3** ngo5  
佢曾經愛過我 She once loved me.

ngo5 **mei6** jam2 **gwo3** ni1 zek3 zau2  
我未飲過呢隻酒 I've not drunk this wine before.

zo2 呃 **versus** gwo3 過

jó 呃 and gwo 過 may appear similar in meaning, both corresponding to the present perfect forms of the verb in English. Indeed there will be cases when either makes sense:

ngo5 tai2 zo2 saam1 go3 ji1 sang1

我睇咗三個醫生

ngo5 tai2 gwo3 saam1 go3 ji1 sang1

我睇過三個醫生

I've (just) seen three doctors.

I've seen three doctors  
(before).

- Ask if someone has tried ( si3 ) Czech cuisine ( zit6 hak1 coi3)
- Ask if someone had dinner yet
- Ask 1 question using gwo3
- Ask 1 question using zo2

The aspect markers **gán** 繫 and **jyuh** 住 attached to verbs express ongoing actions.

hai2 dou6

## Progressive gán 繫 and háidouh 噥度

The progressive suffix **-gán** 繫, like the English progressive '-ing', is used for ongoing activities:

keoi5 ji4 gaa1 hoi1 gan2 wui2

佢而家開堅會

She's having a meeting.

keoi5 dei6 loeng5 go3 king1 gan2 gai2

佢哋兩個傾緊偈

The two of them are chatting.

Although referring most often to the present, verbs with **gán** 繫 may apply to an activity in the past. In such cases, there is typically a past time adverb present to make this clear (see Unit 11; note also the adverb **zung6** 仲 ‘still’):

gau6 nin2 keoi5 **zung6** duk6 **gan2** zung1 hok6 舊年佢仲讀緊中學

Last year she was still studying in secondary school.

keoi5 dei6 soeng6 go3 jyut6 **zung6** paak3 **gan2** to1, ji4 gaa1 ji5 ging1 fan1 zo2 sau2 laa3

佢上個月仲拍緊拖, 而家已經分咗手喇

Last month, they were still dating; now they're already separated.

gan2

Similarly, **gán** 緊 may be used in subordinate clauses referring to the past:

ngo5 duk6 gan2 siu2 hok6 go2 zan6 si4, keoi5 ji5 ging1 sik1 ngo5

我讀緊小學嗰陣時, 佢已經識我

(lit. I studying primary school that time, he already knew me)  
When I was in primary school, she already knew me.

nei5 fan3 gan2 gaau3 go2 zan6 si4, jau5 jan4 daa2 din6 waa2 lai4

你瞓緊覺嗰陣時, 有人打電話嚟

(lit. you sleeping that time, somebody telephoned come)  
Somebody called while you were sleeping.

An alternative means of describing an ongoing action is by using **hai2 dou6** 嘸度, which literally means ‘to be here/there’:

ngo5 hai2 dou6 zou6 gung1 fo3

我喺度做功課

I'm (here) doing homework.

nei5 hai2 dou6 dang2 bin1 go3 aa3?

你喺度等邊個呀?

Who are you waiting for?

keoi5 dei6 hai2 dou6 aai3 gaau1

佢哋喺度嗌交

They're having an argument.

Because of the literal meaning ‘here’, it is suitable where the activity is going on in a location close to the speaker. **háidouh** 嘴度 and **gán** 繫 can also be used together in expressing progressive meaning:

keoi5 hai2 dou6 zyu2 gan2 faan6

佢喺度煮緊飯

lou5 baan2 hai2 dou6 se2 gan2 seon3

老闆喺度寫緊信

She's cooking.

The boss is writing letters.

## Continuous zyu6 住 Mandarin: zhe 著

zyu6 住 added to a verb describes a continuous activity or state without change. It is associated with particular verbs, such as those denoting stationary situations:

gaa3 din6 daan1 ce1 zo2 zyu6 go3 ceot1 hau2 架電單車阻住個出口

The motorbike is blocking the exit.

keoi5 sing4 jat6 zaa1 zyu6 fan6 bou3 zi2 jí 佢成日揸住份報紙

She's always holding a newspaper.

ngo5 jat6 jat6 deoi3 zyu6 tung4 jat1 baan1 jan4 bāan yāhn 我日日對住同樣一班人

I face the same bunch of people every day.

Note that verb + **jyuh** 住 can mean something different from the simple verb by itself, such **nam2 zyu6** 諗住 ‘intend’ versus **nam2** 諗 ‘think’ **tai2 zyu6** 瞭住 ‘watch over’ versus **tai2** 瞭 ‘look, see’:

ngo5 nam2 zyu6 ceng2 keoi5 dei6 sik6 faan6 我諗住請佢哋食飯  
I intend to invite them to dinner.

nei5 tai2 zyu6 ni1 loeng5 go3 sai3 lou6 zai2, m4 hou2 bei2 keoi5 dei6 daa2 gaau1  
你睇住呢兩個細路仔, 唔好畀佢哋打交  
Keep an eye on these two kids, (and) don't let them fight.

A verb with **zyu6** 住 can also be used to describe an action carried out simultaneously with another:

keoi5 mong6 zyu6 ngo5 siu3 佢望住我笑  
(lit. he watching me smiled)  
He smiled (while looking) at me.

keoi5 deoi3 zyu6 ngo5 haam3 佢對住我喊  
She cried at (while facing) me.

nei5 gan1 zyu6 ngo5 haang4 你跟住我行  
Walk after (following) me.

Note that there is no conjunction linking the two verbs (which is a characteristic of the sequences of verb phrases known as serial verb constructions, see *Intermediate Cantonese*, Unit 11).

## Gán 繫 versus jyuh 住

Since both may be translated with progressive ‘-ing’ forms in English, it can be difficult to choose between **gan2** and **zyu6**. As a general rule, **gán** 繫 is appropriate for activities involving change or movement and **jyuh** 住 for static ones.

In many cases, either is possible, sometimes with a marked difference of meaning:

| b keoi5 zoek3 zyu6 tiu4 dyun2 kwan4 in<br>佢著住條短裙          | She was wearing a short skirt.       |
| a keoi5 daai3 gan2 tiu4 zyun3 sek6 geng2 lin2<br>佢戴緊條鑽石頸鏈 | She's putting on a diamond necklace. |
| b keoi5 daai3 zyu6 tiu4 zyun3 sek6 geng2 lin2<br>佢戴住條鑽石頸鏈 | She's wearing a diamond necklace.    |

In each case **gán** 繫 indicates a dynamic, changing situation and **jyuh** 住 a static one.
