'PRIMITIVISM'

• art that employs 'primitive' elements or forms

Primitivism in art involves the appreciation and imitation of art (craft) and practices perceived to be "primitive," or at an earlier stage of a supposed common scale of human development.

- 1. 'Primitives' of the 14-15th century
- 2. Non-western = south American, south Asian, and especially Africa, Oceania
- 3. Untrained amateur artists
- 4. Child art


Masaccio, *The Tribute Money*, fresco in the Brancacci Chapel in Santa Maria del Carmine, Florence. Around 1425




LATE 19th CENTURY



Jean Jacques Rousseau (1712-78):

- lives according to universal natural law
- Is inherently moral and good
- Possesses indigenous knowledge
- lives simple life




ORIENTALISM


- Sees non-Europeans as unenlightened or illogical,
- justifies European intervention in that culture

PRIMITIVISM

- parallels these early fixations with Eastern civilizations.
- Primitivism is a mixture of admiration and denigration, appreciation and exploitation, elevation and repression.



"The masks were unlike any other sculpture. Not in the least. They were pathfinders – the Negroes' sculptures – against everything; mysterious, menacing spirits."





'In our own time every earthenware vessel or piece of jewellery, every utensil or garment, has to be designed on paper before it is made. Absolute originality, the intense and often grotesque expression of power and life in very simple forms – that may be why we like these works of native art.'























Summing up PRIMITIVIST ART

- Goes against conventions
- References the idea of the 'noble savage'
- Contains a level of
 - Naivety
 - simplicity, sincerity
 - purity and instinct
 - timeless innocence
 - truthfulness
 - nudity
- Inspired by non-European works, art of children, amateur artists, historic precedents (Italian, Dutch primitifs, El Greco, ...)
