 - 2. It's good that you reminded me about Ann's birthday. I would have forgotten if you had not reminded me.
 - 3. Unfortunately, I didn't have my address book with me when I was in New York. If I had had your address, I would have sent you a postcard.
 - 4. A: How was your holiday? Did you have a nice time? B: It was OK, but I would have enjoyed it more if the weather had been better.
