valley	/ˈvæli/	a low area of land between mountains or hills, usually with a river flowing through it
to blow away		if something blows away or is blown away, the wind moves it away from you until you cannot see or touch it
lava dome	/dəʊm/	a roof shaped like the top half of a ball
crater	/ˈkreɪtə(r)/	the round hole at the top of a volcano

resilient	/rɪ'zɪliənt/	able to quickly become healthy, happy, or strong again after an illness, disappointment, or other problem
to blast	/blɑːst/	to destroy or move earth, rock, or metal using a series of explosions
to devastate	/'devə,steɪt/	to seriously damage or completely destroy something
debris (uncountable)	/'debrɪː/	the broken pieces that are left when something large has been destroyed, especially by an explosion, fire, or accident
lightning		the bright flashes of light that you see in the sky during a storm (a flash of lightning)
to howl (dogs)	/haʊl/	if a dog or similar animal howls, it makes a long loud sound
slope	/sləʊp/	a straight surface that has one end higher than the other
